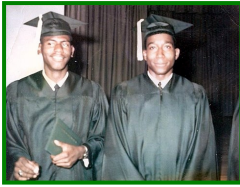

That empathy has carried over to a successful 34-year career in public education in Washington, a career Klinger recently decided to retire from. "Last summer I was out kayaking and having a great time. I thought, another 180 days of teaching or retiring to this? I decided to call it quits and so I did." Dave is now freely pursuing his love of kayaking, birding, and amateur radio operation as W7DEK."

As for his career in education, "I enjoyed it all." "The thing I will miss the most is the camaraderie with the other teachers and the staff at NYC. I felt I had a great reading program and a great paragraph and theme writing program. As an English teacher I tried to cram as much knowledge into every student I had during the time they were with me."

After graduation in 1965, Dave went to college at Tacoma Community College and then Evergreen State College, where he graduated in 1974. "I took a job at Central City Learning Center in Tacoma and worked with kids with either Down's Syndrome or autism for three years. From there I got a job as a tutor at Ilwaco High School for two years and then for two years was a reading tutor at Naselle Youth Camp." In 1981 Klinger earned a teaching certificate from Western Washington University and became a full-time English teacher at NYC the following school year. He held that post for 27 years. "My favorite extra-curricular activity was coaching middle school track. I will miss coaching very much."

Debbie (Klinger's wife who also teaches in the Naselle school district) and I will enjoy paddling the river together." Dave has three daughters and plans to spend more time with them, also. Dave Klinger concludes, "I would recommend being a teacher to anybody who is considering it as a career." From the sounds of things he would recommend retiring after 34 years to anybody, as well.

I talked to Dave and he has been able to finally alphabetize his entire library of books, fix the doorbell, and has been working on his beach home. I think he's doing pretty much whatever he wants! (Linda)

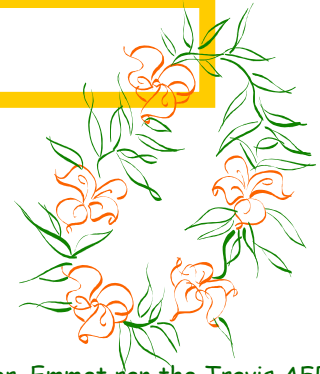

Emmet turns 76 in May.

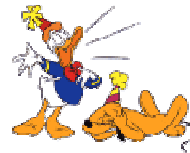
